Sao Chang College Self Study Report (SSR) is the anatomy of the college. It is the detail description about the mobilization, establishment, development, functions, academic activities and achievement of the college. This is the most important piece of documentation about the college history. The college was established as a private night college by a handful of visionaries among the people in the District. In 1973, when the college was established for a few office goers, many people were sceptical about the growth of the college to the present status. However, slowly and gradually, the college emerged with full stature and shape to the present status into a fully fledged degree college in the entire District. The college is a co-educational institution and the students are drawn from every nook and corner of the district.

In 1983, the college was taken over by the State Government. The college has both Arts and Science streams with Honours paper in all the Arts disciplines viz. English, Economics, Education, History, Political Science and Sociology while Science stream offers Pass course in Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology and Mathematics.

The college is now prepared and ready to be assessed and accredited by NAAC. The college has adequate and qualified teachers drawn from various disciplines. The college is taking positive steps to be assessed by NAAC. It is felt that once the college is assessed and accredited by NAAC, the college would strive to achieve greater height.

1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Sao Chang College, erstwhile Tuensang College, was established in 1973 as a private institution under the initiatives of Late. H. Sao Chang, an educationist and former Minister of Nagaland, along with some well wishers and visionaries of the town. The college is located in one of the remotest part of Northeast India bordering Myanmar. Initially, it was started as a night shift college and from 1974 it became day shift with Pre-University and Degree courses. The college was taken over by the state government in 1983. After the demise of Shri. H.Sao Chang, being the founder of the college and in recognition of his service to the society, the college was named after him as Sao Chang College by Government of Nagaland in 1984. In the beginning, it was located in the heart of the town where there was no scope for further expansion. After recognizing the difficulties faced by the college, the state government procured the present site from private land owners. On completion of basic infrastructures in 1996, the college was shifted to the present campus. Presently, it is located at Khuphailak Sector, near 3rd Battalion Nagaland Armed Police (NAP) Camp, Tuensang, which is approximately nine kilometers away from the main town. The College has two streams i.e. Arts and Science. Arts stream has six disciplines with Honours Course in all the subjects and the Science stream has five disciplines offering Pass course. The college has requested the concerned authority for approval of starting Honours subject in science as well, for which the approval is awaited. The college has an administrative and establishment building with two academic buildings one each for Arts and Science. The college has a Multipurpose Hall as well as separate Sochum (hostel) for boys and girls.

Vision

To provide opportunities for higher learning so as to produce useful and responsible citizens of the country, that they may bring social, economic and educational development in the country. All these can be visualized through total personality development of the students by imparting quality higher education under the college motto "Deeds Not Words".

Mission

To educate young students and prepare them to transcend in the service of the country and to attain personal fulfilment by leading a value based life through innovative and student friendly curriculum.

- 11. Weak internet connectivity.

C. Institutional Opportunities:

- 1. Sufficient land is available for further infrastructural development.
- 2. The college has the potentials to be upgraded to PG college.
- 3. The college can provide life skills programme to help graduate students to find employment in areas such as entrepreneurship.
- 4. The college can improve educational system and achieve better academic performance.
- 5. Ample opportunity for rain water harvesting

D. Institutional Challenges/Threats

- 1. College is located at a remote area in the easternmost part of the state.
- 2. Students are mostly from socially and economically weaker sections of the society.
- 3. Insufficient teaching-learning materials.
- 4. Less enrolments in Science Stream due to few feeder Higher Secondary Schools and lack of honours programme in the college.
- 5. Lack of inter-disciplinary programme.
- 6. Lack of proper connectivity with other parts of the country.
- 7. Mobilisation of fund is a big challenge due to economically and socially poor environment.
- 8. Recycling of waste is a big challenge.
- 9. Students drop-out due to social and economical problems.

1.3 CRITERIA-WISE SUMMARY

<u>Criterion 1 – Curricular Aspects</u>

Curricular Planning and Implementation

Curriculum planning and development includes formulation and preparation of academic calendar, class time table and preparation of lesson plans. Implementation covers the wide range of theoretical, conceptual and practical aspects of teaching-learning process. Continuous mode of assessment is practiced in the curriculum through systems such as examination, tests, seminars, assignments, projects and so on to monitor students' progress.

Academic Flexibility

In the area of academic flexibility the college has History, Political Science, Economics and Education as elective subjects, English as compulsory subjects and Honours Course in History, Political Science and English since its inception. Sociology was introduced as an elective subject in 1983. In 2005, science stream was introduced in the college with Botany, Zoology, Chemistry, Physics and Mathematics as elective subjects. Computer science in 3rd semester and EVS in 5th Semester are compulsory subjects. As part of CBCS course, Environmental Studies was introduced in 2012 in 6th semester. Honours Courses were introduced in the subjects viz. Education, Sociology and Economics in 2017.

As a part of Certified Vocational Course, the college has introduced floriculture in 2016 which was sponsored by RUSA. 17 students were enrolled in 2016-2017 and 25 students in 2017-2018. At present, 26 students are undergoing the course.

Curriculum Enrichment

With regard to curriculum enrichment, the college offers Floriculture Course in which 2 students in 2016-2017 and 19 students in 2017-2018 had successfully completed the programme.

Feedback system

The college has a feedback mechanism to evaluate the overall performance of all the stakeholders. Through this system, suggestions are provided by the stakeholders on aspects of students' achievement and improvement in the academic pursuit. Feedbacks received from students are taken into consideration which are discussed thoroughly by the college authority and IQAC. Feedback from Teachers is also given utmost importance to enhance the teaching-learning processes. Parents and Alumni feedback so received are given due consideration for effective implementation. Overall, the feedback system helps the college administrators, faculty and students to achieve optimal teaching-learning outcome.

Criterion 2 – Teaching-Learning and Evaluation

The admission committee is assigned with the task of admitting students under the overall supervision of the Principal. Equal opportunity is given to all students seeking admission without any discrimination. Admission fee concessions (one time) are being given to differently-abled students. To make the teaching learning process students centric, the institution emphasizes on activities such as career guidance, counseling and mentoring programmes.

The performance of the students is evaluated through 30:70 basis i,e 30 marks for Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) and 70 marks are evaluated through end semester examination. CIE is conducted through tutorials, test, assignments, seminars, group discussion, debate, quiz, remedial classes etc.

To update their knowledge, teachers are encouraged to participate in orientation, refresher, short term courses and other such programmes. Moreover teachers are also encouraged to take up research projects, publication and pursuing Ph.D.

The institution has a feedback mechanism whereby teachers are evaluated through questionnaires received from the students. The college principal takes the overall charge in assessing the feedbacks and informs the teachers to adopt corrective measures.

Criterion 3 – Research, Innovations and Extension

The Educational, Research, Innovation and Consultancy Cell take the matters of research and innovation in the college. The cell has formulated code of publishing ethics for research papers. It conducts departmental seminars where the research papers are presented by the faculty. The papers so presented are published in the form of Journals. So far the college has published two Journals with ISSN 2321 2330 and six research papers in various National and International journals. In edited books, three papers have been published as book chapters.

The college has conducted several sensitization programmes as part of community extension services. The Faculty members have also visited Kodhi's Children Home (Orphanage) and provided them lunch and distributed gifts during Independence and Republic Day. Several faculty members of the institution have received recognition certificates for their extension activities from Government and Recognized bodies. The college has units of NSS, NCC, Red Ribbon Club and RUSA through which the college renders its services to the society in collaboration with district

administration, NGO and local bodies. The college has signed MoU with Krishi Vigyan Kendra, Eleutherius Christian Society and Nagaland State Co-operative Bank.

<u>Criterion 4 – Infrastructure and Learning Resources</u>

Sao Chang College campus has an area of 40 acres with a built-up area of only 8 acres (approx) and has potential for further expansion. The college has Arts and Science academic building, administrative building (Principal, Vice Principal, RUSA, IQAC Offices, canteen and conference hall), Sochum (Hostel) for both boys and girls, 11 (eleven) quarters for the staff and multipurpose hall making it a compositely functioning campus. The college provides adequate infrastructural facility to meet the functional requirements. Laboratory equipments are as per the syllabi and are maintained by the respective departments with the assistance of laboratory assistants and bearers. Volley ball court, Table Tennis Hall cum gymnasium and multipurpose hall are utilized for the college's sports and co-curricular activities by both day scholars and campus dwellers. The library is under CCTV surveillance to monitor the students' activities and has a separate reading room for boys and girls. It is equipped with three computers to facilitate easy access of the library facilities. The Information Technology and Communication Cell (IT&CC) looks after the IT facilities that are available in the college. The cell conducts computer literacy program for the students at regular intervals and the same is extended for the teaching and non-teaching staff. A smart class room was constructed funded under Rashtriya Uchchattar Shiksha Abhiyan (RUSA) project. The Infrastructure Development and Improvement Cell (ID&IC) of the college is responsible for identifying the shortfalls in the existing infrastructure for remedial measures. The maintenance of the physical and student support facilities are delegated to various cells such as ID&IC, IT&CC, Library advisory Committee, etc. and are being constantly monitored by the IQAC.

Criterion 5 - Student Support and Progression

Support to students and their progression is an integral part of any educational institution for the overall progress of the students. In this aspect, maximum students of the college receive Post-Matric Scholarship for Scheduled Tribes sponsored by the Government. Financial aids are given by the college to buy books to the poorest students and persons with disability (PwDs). Remedial coaching class for slow learners is provided under Tutorial classes. Career guidance programme is also organized from time to time to update the knowledge about their future career. Under the mentoring programme, the students are being provided personal counseling by their respective mentors. In the area of vocational education and training, college is providing certificate course on Floriculture, sponsored by Rashtriya Uchchattar Shiksha Abhiyan (RUSA). The institution has achieved zero cases of ragging and sexual harassment for the past five years. Regarding student's grievances, there were few cases which was addressed and settled judiciously by the committee.

The Sao Chang College Alumni Association which was established in 2011 remains as a valuable external support to the development and progress of the college. In order to maintain proper records of the Alumni, online registration has been introduced recently .Sports, cultural and literary activities are the integral part of the college. The college conducts these activities annually to showcase the talents of the students. The students actively participate in all these activities. The sports events include both indoor and outdoor disciplines. The cultural activities comprises of folk dance, folk lore narration, folk song, etc. The college has a Students' Union body namely the Sao Chang College Students' Union (SCCSU). The members of the SCCSU are elected every academic year through secret ballot voting system by the students of the college. The Students' Union is funded by the students themselves, for which, it is collected at the time of admission. The primary objective of the Students' Union is to address the needs of the students and to act as a bridge between the students' community and college administration.

Criterion 6 – Governance, Leadership and Management

Sao Chang College was established as the first college in the district and the third Government College in the State, thereby becoming a major centre for higher education. The vision and mission of the college enumerates the institution's characteristics in terms of the need of the population where it is situated and its action plans for the present and the future. The college has immensely contributed in giving back to the society by producing remarkable intellectual, professionals, and conscientious citizens who are serving the society in various areas.

Taking from the authority to the head of department, teaching and non-teaching faculty are distinguished by their passion, integrity, commitment and above all a desire to bring changes to the old fold. These are possible because of the coming together of the community of faculty, staff and students. The leadership and management have moved beyond narrow defined roles of governance, motivated by a mission to ensure that the young people who enter the portals of the college move on to impact outside world both locally and globally at personal level as well as at public level.

The college work through the committee system, all faculty members are coordinators and members of various committees and it is through these committees that the college functions. Vice-Principal and teachers who are in-charge of their respective department ensure the decentralized working of the college. Very often the initiatives come from Principal or faculty members from whom the matters are discussed at the level of the department or staff council. On some occasions the ideas contributed by the students are interpreted and translated into reality by the college. The Principal ensures that planning, administration and management take place according to resolution made in the meeting. The best monitoring mechanism is the committees and the cell headed by the coordinators.

Criterion 7- Institutional Values and Best Practices.

The college undertakes gender equity initiatives by conducting programmes /seminars on topics like Human Trafficking, Statutory Rights of women etc. It also provides special facilities like counseling, common room for boys and girls to maintain gender equity. For creating awareness on environmental consciousness and sustainability certain steps are initiated by the institution like installation of bamboo woven waste bins, plantation drives, minimal use of hazardous chemicals in the laboratory, tobacco and plastic free campus, etc. For conservation of energy, the institution has replaced the use of incandescent bulbs by LED bulbs. The institution provides special facilities like ramp, wheelchair, reserved seats in the bus and classroom, restrooms etc for persons with disability. The importance and benefits of rain water harvesting is also initiated by the institution. The college plays an important role in infusing in the minds of the students and faculties the essence of human values and professional ethics.

The two best practices of the college chosen are Academic Excellence Award (AEA) and Museum and Fine Arts. One of the best practices of the college is the Academic Excellence Award which is given to students who excel in academic and co-curricular activities. Incentives in the form of cash award and citations, motivates the students to push themselves and excel in academics and life's challenges. The literary committee along with the History department of Sao Chang College suggested for formation of a literary and fine arts club as it was found that when students learn to appreciate art, they gain confidence as both intellectuals and creators. The *Morung* system of imparting education known as urban *Sochem* is recognized as the Institutional Distinctiveness with the objective that this practice probes the students to introspect the importance of preserving one's culture and identity, and at the same time adapt to modern day society.

The college adopts and implements the curriculum framework provided by Nagaland University. It carries out the different institutional activities keeping in mind the available resources, potentials, institutional goals and objectives. In tune with Nagaland University notifications, Principal, Vice Principal and Academic calendar committee formulate its own academic calendar prior to the commencement of every academic session and follows with strict adherence. Academic calendar comprises of curricular activities, extra- curricular activities and holiday list. Curricular activities include preparation of class time table for all the teaching faculties by the Head of the Departments (HODs) for the smooth functioning of classes. The college has adequate number of classrooms and a functional Library to facilitate and provide aid to the students as well as for the teachers. Library also provides Magazines, Journals and Newspapers in order to enhance more teaching-learning experience. Moreover, the college also has smart-classroom, LCD Projectors, Desktops, Laptops, Printers and Photocopying machines for effective learning. The college also provides daily bus transportation to day scholars. Curricular activities also include conducting of internal examinations,	
	Seminars, Class test, Group discussion, Public speaking, home assignments, project field trips, study tours, etc to assess, enhance and build up the students' confidence. External examinations are being conducted as per University schedule. The institution assesses the learning levels of the students, after admission and organizes special programs for advanced learners and slow learners

Slow learners:- Slow learners are those students who are below average intelligence and therefore at risk of dropping out of the college. Teachers give guidance and counselling to overcome their problems and build confidence among them. This enables them to make proper adjustments with curriculum and college activities. Slow learners are identified from their peers after which remedial classes is given to them so that they can catch up with their peers. To make them comprehend a clearer concept of the subject matter, teaching aids like power point presentation, charts, etc. are used. Continuous evaluation is done to test their performance by way of class test, assignment, class work and group discussion to build confidence in them. The mentor identifies the problem of the slow learners and assists them accordingly. Sometimes home visits by the mentors are carried out in order to build a healthy relationship with the parents and also to find out the problems of the parents / guardians. Counselling is also given so that the students build confidence in them, develop a habit of self study, independent thinking and to bring out their hidden skills. These activities help them to catch up to their peers. Parents of the slow learners are also made aware of the learning problems of their children. They are also assisted in planning and decision making for their future career.

Advanced learners: - Advanced learners are identified through classroom activities like tests, seminars, group discussions, quiz, assignments and co-curricular activities. Through remedial classes the advanced learners are motivated to enhance their skills further .They are encouraged to take part in various activities organized by NGO's, district administration and other such

Care is taken to ensure that separate time tables are being devised so that regular classes dealing with syllabus is not disrupted. The internal marks secured by the students in their subjects are being subsequently submitted to the vice-principal within a stipulated time frame. The marks thus secured in all subjects by the students are being displayed so that the students get to know their marks. This system which is formulated by the University continually evaluates the students throughout the semester.	
Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of	15
The mechanism of internal assessment conducted in a transparent and robust manner. As per the University norms 70% (70 marks) of the total marks are allotted for End term examination and 30% (30 marks) marks are assessed internally. Every year at the beginning of the session, one day orientation programme is conducted to enlighten the students about the CIE. In that programme, the full detail about the internal assessment is clearly explained to the students. So the students are fully aware of the internal assessment of the college. 30% of the marks are assessed through Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) which includes- class tests, seminar, group discussions, project work, open book test, debate, quiz, home assignments and public speeches. For the conduct of class test, the college authority fixes the time frame which is being followed accordingly. Out of a total of 30 marks, 20 marks is allotted for class test which is conducted twice. The class test so conducted are evaluated by the teachers wherein the remarks noted are handed over to the individual students so that their errors are rectified. The highest marks scored of the two tests is being taken. From the remaining 10 marks, 5 marks each is allotted for any two of the following activities viz. seminar, group discussions, project work, open book test, debate, quiz, home assignments and public speeches. The Internal assessment marks is submitted to the college authority as per the given schedule. The authority calls for a HoDs meeting to analyse and finalise the internal assessment of the students. The final list of the students is chalked out and placed on the notice board. Students who scored 45% of the 30 marks in

Examination Committee, headed by vice-principal, is set up in the college to handle all issues relating to examination matters. The college follows strictly the guideline and rules issued by the affiliated university for all examination related matters. The matters of internal assessment and evaluation are done by the concerned department of the college. The Internal Assessment Test paper and home assignment are given to the students after evaluation to verify any anomalies in the marks allotted and make sure that there is no discrepancies in the allotment of marks. Thereby transparency and time bound redressal mechanism is maintained in the college. The evaluation process is carried out with utmost sincerity. However in

The internal marks secured by the students in their subjects are being subsequently submitted to the vice-principal within a stipulated time frame. The marks thus secured in all subjects by the students are being displayed so that the students get to know their marks. This system which is formulated by the University continually evaluates the students throughout the semester. Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and variety The mechanism of internal assessment conducted in a transparent and robust manner. As per the University norms 70% (70 marks) of the total marks are allotted for End term examination and 30% (30 marks) marks are assessed internally. Every year at the beginning of the session, one day orientation programme is conducted to enlighten the students about the CIE. In that programme, the full detail about the internal assessment is clearly explained to the students. So the students are fully aware of the internal assessment of the college. 30% of the marks are assessed through Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) which includes- class tests, seminar, group discussions, project work, open book test, debate, quiz, home assignments and public speeches. For the conduct of class test, the college authority fixes the time frame which is being followed accordingly. Out of a total of 30 marks, 20 marks is allotted for class test which is conducted twice. The class test so conducted are evaluated by the teachers wherein the remarks noted are handed over to the individual students so that their errors are rectified. The highest marks scored of the two tests is being taken. From the remaining 10 marks, 5 marks each is allotted for any two of the following activities viz. seminar, group discussions, project work, open book test, debate, qui

the event of any clerical mistakes detected, the redressal of the grievances is corrected promptly. AS per Nagaland University guideline, minimum 3 (three) assessment activities are to be carried out by the college in every semester for 30 marks viz. internal assessment test, seminar, group discussions, project work, open book test, debate, quiz, home assignments, public speeches, etc. Accordingly the college decides to conduct internal assessment test for 20 marks and 5 marks each for any two activities. As per the academic calendar of the college, Internal Assessment test are conducted twice in every semester and the schedule is prepared by the Examination Committee for a duration of 1(one) hour . This schedule is being circulated to each and every teachers and also to the students. The Examination Committee sees to it that the schedule is being followed strictly and the exams are being conducted smoothly. Stipulated time is being fixed for the students to submit any one of the activities for 5 marks from project work or home assignments. Similarly for another 5 marks, activities such as seminar, group discussions, open book test, debate, quiz, public speeches are being conducted. Pass mark for the internal assessment is 45% of 30 marks. As per the academic calendar, all the departments are to submit the consolidated internal assessment marks to the Vice-Principal for further scrutinization and declaration of result. Students clearing all the internal assessment papers shall be eligible to fill up the forms for external end semester examination. Time table is prepared for conduct of remedial classes for all subjects on every working day of the week . Information processing models of teaching emphasize the ways in which the students obtain information about the course objectives and the overall understanding of the subject matter and also the course outcome. The effective communication takes place when the decoder and encoder are ready for comprehension of the presented information. The college uses the mechanism of website, notice board and classroom communication.

The following mechanism is widely used in the college;

- 1. Presenting the curriculum to the students through website and classroom
- 2. Use of Technologies in the classroom for effective teaching- learning process.
- 3. Seminars and workshops are conducted on curriculum relevant topics.
- 4. Assignments and class tests are carried out to assess the students' knowledge of the course.
- 5. Classroom discussions are held to enhance the cognitive ability of the students.
- 6. Students' are made aware of their academic performance through a feedback mechanism.
- 7. The college administrators are informed about the students' performance by submitting monthly assessment by the respective departments.
- 8. Continuous Internal Evaluation are also notified in the classroom and notice board

2.6.2 QlM

Attainment of program outcomes, program specific outcomes and course outcomes are evaluated by the institution

As per the University norms 70% (70 marks) of the total marks are allotted for End Semester Examination which is conducted by the University and 30% (30marks) are assessed internally (CIE) by the institution. Out of the 30 marks, class test are conducted for 20 marks, twice in each semester. The remaining 10 marks, 5 marks each is allotted for any two of the following activities viz. seminar, group discussions, project work, open book test, debate, quiz, home assignments and public speeches. The success and failures of the students are assessed by their results which are analysed during the end semester examination. The University prepares Examination schedules as well as the question papers for the End Semester Examination. The examination committee of the college prepares the duty roster as well as other modalities for the smooth conduct of the exam in the college. As per the University norms the evaluation of the 4th and 6th semester examination papers are sent to the University for external evaluation. All other end semester Examination papers are evaluated internally by the institution.

Tutorial/Remedial classes are conducted for the students which are held after the regular classes. Interested students can nroll themselves voluntarily for the classes. Through these classes the students are given extra attention by the subject teachers. Time table is prepared for conduct of remedial classes for all subjects on every working day of the week.

Home assignments are given for 5 marks for all the subjects. Students are given the stipulated time period to prepare and submit the assignments.

Seminar, group discussions, project work, open book test, debate, quiz, and public speeches are conducted for 5 marks by the concerned subject teachers.

For the efficient evaluation of the curriculum, the institution gives importance to the feedbacks received from stakeholders. Feedback forms are prepared for all stakeholders separately and given to them for assessment which is further analysed and follow-up action are taken appropriately.

The college has various committees and sub-committees who are empowered to take decisions on matters of their concerned committee. The college also has planning and development cell that decides and recommend agendas for implementation. All the recommendations are submitted to the Principal who then decide to implement at his/her table. Every member of the committee performs their duties under the supervision of the coordinator. Time to time the Principal invites the department and committees to deliberate on the plan, functioning and the vision of the college. Every staff is obligatory to not only class room activities, but also to other extra-curriculum activities. The Principal ensures that the teaching faculty and the tutorials take place according to the laid down norms. All these can be visualised through total personality development of the students by imparting quality higher education under the college motto, "Deeds not Words."

6.1.2 QlM

The institution practices decentralization and participative management

Sao Chang College is a government run institution under the Directorate of Higher Education. Being a government college, the Directorate of Higher Education, Government of Nagaland administers, directs, and authorises policies and plans for stable functioning of the institution. Through decentralised planning, the Principal and Staff are actively involved in implementing the policy and plan of the Directorate. Being the head of the institution the Principal takes the responsibility of leadership in looking into the requirements of the above aspects. To assist the Principal, different committees and cells are delegated to execute and supervise the implementation of the policies and plans. The office of Vice-Principal, the various teaching faculty who are in-charge of their respective departments ensure the decentralised working of the college.

Since culture and tradition are integral part of Naga society, Sao Chang College has a Cultural Committee that plays a vital role in disseminating cultural knowledge among the students. Every year the college conducts cultural day wherein various cultural activities such as dance, traditional songs, folklore narrations, art of storytelling, basketry, textile weaving, body tattooing, traditional games are displayed. For the conduct of the cultural activities, the college authority sanctions required amount to the committee .The committee is given the discretion to organise and utilize the said amount as per their needs and requirements. Meetings are conducted amongst the members to chalk out the strategic plans which are to be executed .

One of the activities that was successfully conducted by the committee through decentralisation and participative management in the institution was a "Cultural Discourse on the Nagas" which was held on 17th September 2014. There was a fusion music presentation and a documentary film on the Nagas "The Man Who Hunted Head" and "The Last Man Standing" which was screened on the particular occasion. A paper on Naga culture was presented by Dr. Iris Odyuo, Co-ordinator, Cultural Committee. As part of the cultural activity, there was also a traditional dance competition between the various tribal groups (students) of the college.

A woman, lady or a girl creates balance in our society, we exist because she exists. To protect the dignity and rights of women, the college has 'Internal Compliant Committee'. The students are briefed about the instances of sexual harassment that take place in the work place or institution to let them know the consequences that the offenders have to pay. The college urges the male students to recognize the important role that a women play in the society, and that, women are no longer the weaker section of the society. The female students are encouraged to report any instances of sexual harassment (if any) to the committee. This ensures that the harasser is accountable for his action and he is not left scot-free. The victims should not remain silent in the event of such incidents but instead seek for justice as it would embolden the harasser to commit such act in future also. This ensures that the modesty of the women is not abused or violated. In case of incidents faced outside the college the women are directed to seek assistance from any NGOs associated with women rights. Also they can report to the nearest police station and administration with the help of women leaders. Refusal by the concerned police officer would invite suitable punishment. The college has instituted 'Anti-Ragging Committee' so that ragging in any form is strongly discouraged. The students are made aware that if they are found guilty of ragging, severe punishment will be imposed upon them. Till date no instances of ragging have been reported. 1. Number of specific initiatives to address locational advantages and disadvantages during the last five years

Locational Advantages Addressed:-

To make use of the vast land area, Tree plantation drives were undertaken on 2nd August 2017 and 2nd June 2018. Again Broom grass cultivation was undertaken from 8th to 15th July 2017. On 14th and 15th July 2017 Bamboo Plantation was carried out. In the month of August and September 2017 Cardamom and Garlic plantation was undertaken. The cultivated bamboos were used for making bio-degradable bins and installed in the campus on 29th March 2017. The area is conducive for flower cultivation, 4 polyhouses were installed in the campus for vocational course in the year 2016, 2017 and 2018 respectively. Taking advantage of heavy rainfall in the region, permanent as well as temporary Rainwater harvesting system were set up in 2017 for college as well as floriculture purposes. The college has started a policy for the students called 'Earn While You Learn' in the year 2017. Under this policy the students are engaged in manual labour after college hours and holidays for cultivation and weeding of cultivated plants in the college. Through this policy the students learn how to plant crops and weed out scientifically and they earn at the same time.

Locational Disadvantages Addressed:-

Due to the remoteness as well as the region being located in hilly terrain and rainy area, road condition, communication, and power supply are very poor. To address these issues Drainage clearance drive was organised by NSS and local community of Khupailak colony from College gate to the campus on 23^{rd} August 2014. Time to time social work are conducted to fill up the pothole from College gate to the campus. The college is located 9 kms away from the town, therefore *Sochum* (hostels) facilities were provided since 2017 to lessen the transportation problem. College buses are provided to transport the students, teaching and non—teaching staff. To provide regular bus service, the college undertakes major repairing of the buses periodically

college administration, much attention is given in this area that no loophole is occurred in academic exercise.

The Principal is the ultimate authority of the college administration and the overall controlling officer. No educational institutions can survive unless the college authority dispenses transparency in administrative exercise. Having realized the importance of transparency and accountability in college administration, the college authority maintains certain standards of administrative policies, while exercising the authority powers and functions. Title of the practice Academic Excellence Award (AEA) Objective

In today's scenario, the level of competition in all spheres of life including higher education has reached its zenith where only the best progresses and there is no room for the second best. To motivate and help the students excel in their academic performance, the college came up with a novel idea to award the students scoring the highest percentage amongst them (both arts and science). The fundamental idea behind this novel concept is to instil a sense of healthy competitive spirit among the students and also to produce competent students in the society.

Context

The remote geographical location of Sao Chang College, Tuensang, coupled with the fact that the college comprises of students who belong to economically weaker sections of the society means that these students are exposed to fewer opportunities as compared to most students in Nagaland. As such, the college is in constant need of various financial assistances to encourage and motivate the students in their pursuit for excellence in higher education which otherwise is a luxury for this group of students.

Keeping this important aspect in view, an Award Committee was formed in order to contact and coordinate with willing sponsors, to initiate new award schemes and also to manage the rewarding of monetary awards to students who excel in academic and extra-curricular activities.

Practices.

In line with the objective of the college to encourage intelligent and smart students to pursue higher education and also to motivate students to actively participate in co-curricular activities Academic Excellence Awards have been instituted by the college. After the declaration of the 6th semester result the examination of which is conducted by Nagaland University (N.U.), students with the highest percentage of marks are identified (this is tabulated for arts and science streams separately). Subsequently, the selected college toppers from both the arts and science streams are felicitated during the college Fresher's Day. The award carries an amount of Rs.5000 along with a citation which is sponsored by the family of Lt. P. Chuba Chang (Ex-minister) and another award of Rs.5000 along with a citation sponsored by the family of Lt. Aoyongdang Chang. Any student (from both arts and science) who tops the university examination is also awarded a sum of Rs. 5000 along with a citation which is sponsored by the family of Lt. Tsubongse Sangtam Ex-minister. Apart from this," the student of the year" award is also given to excelling students who perform well in sports, co-curricular activities and academic studies.

The academic excellence awards for the different academic years in both the Science and Arts streams are listed below:-

- a) 2014-2015:-Mr.B.Yemlongchingmak Chang in Science and Mr.K.Ngishang in Arts.
- b) 2015-2016:- Mr.Moalemba S.Chang in Science and Ms.Tsapila in Arts.
- c) 2016-2017:- Ms.Priyanka in Science and Mr.Bakhum Chuba in Arts.
- d) 2017-2018:-Ms. Changkumla in Science and Ms. Marina in Arts.
- e) 2018-2019:-Ms. Tango.C in Science and Mr.Y.Khumdile in Arts

The "Student of the Year" is awarded to a student who excels in overall performances in academic as well extra-curricular activities. Following are the students awarded under this category:-

- a) 2016-2017:- Ms.Y.Sentinaro.
- b) 2017-2018:- Chongnu Lhovum
- c) 2018-2019:- Nasetmongko. Y.

Best Debater of the Year:- In order to instil versatility among students and also to ensure over-all development of the students, the college organizes various literary activities among which debate competition is one of the main events. The winner of the debate competition is conferred with the title, "Best Debater of the Year". The award carries a cash prize of Rs.1000 and a citation which is sponsored by the family of late Chiten Sangtam. A select group of judges from amongst the faculty is entrusted with the responsibility to choose the best debater.

Evidence of Success

It has been observed that since the initiation of the Academic Excellence Awards, there has been a marked increase in the level of sincerity and hard work in the academic performance and eager participation in the extracurricular activities. It has successfully instilled a healthy spirit of competition amongst the students to give their best in every endeavour that they undertake.

Most importantly, the awards serve as an incentive to the students to pursue higher education as it not only provides financial assistance but also inspire them with a sense of self-confidence to compete at higher level. This has been witnessed through the fact that the recipients of the award are found to have

completed their master's degree even topping in their respective honours paper as well as securing the highest percentage among the entire discipline of N.U. Some students have even gone on to pursue their Ph.D course which is a remarkable achievement considering the fact that they have to face stiff competiton from the B.A/B.Sc honours' students from urban colleges to get admitted to master degree course, they being from general background.

This has been manifested in the number of alumni holding high positions in Govt. offices by clearing competitive exams, heading successful business establishments and making valuable contributions to the welfare of the society through their achievements.

Problems Encountered and resources required

The award was constituted at a time when the amount seemed a tidy sum. But with the increase in the standard of living, the amount is not sufficient anymore even to supplement a year's tuition fees. Taking this into account the amount needs to be increased to help the students cover the expenses in the initial stage of their further studies or other endeavors which would decrease the burden on the parents considering the fact that most of the parents are without a regular source of income. It would be a welcome sight for individual(s), groups and professors to reach out with more sponsorship so that the students are not deprived of their desired goal just because they happen to come from economically weaker section of the society. This would indeed pave the way for shaping the career and life of many students which will make positive impact in the society.

Note

Incentives in the form of cash award and citations are important to motivate the students to push themselves and excel in academics and in life. It instills a sense of self-confidence to go through life and face every challenge that comes in one's way. As such, institutions should find more ways and measures to reward excelling students.

BEST PRACTICE -2

Title of the practice TRIBAL MUSEUM AND FINE ARTS.

According to the International Council of Museums (ICOM), the definition of museum is "a non-profit, permanent institution in the service of society and its development, open to the public, which acquires, conserves, researches, communicates and exhibits the tangible and intangible heritage of humanity and its environment for the purposes of education, study and enjoyment"(2007). The museum of Sao Chang College brings alive the various arts of the Nagas. The museum was established in 2018 with the financial support from the college administration. It is housed within the college campus. The Department of History is entrusted with the collection, documentation, exhibition and researches for the museum.

AIMS AND OBJECTIVES:

- 1. To preserve and showcase Naga artefacts for teaching the history and traditions of the Nagas to the students and visitors.
- 2. To be an informal educational centre for disseminating traditional knowledge of performing arts such as folk songs and dances.

- 3. Encourage storytelling and cultural activities.
- 4. Conduct research and documentation. The museum is also planning to bring out leaflets, posters and art albums to help students and visitors to know more about the Nagas.
- 5. Encourage traditional and modern art among the students.
- 6. Encourage Naga elders to teach the students traditional Naga art such as basketry, tattooing, Blacksmith, woodcarving and textile weaving.

EXHIBITS:

The college museum exhibits traditional and modern basket works, textiles, woodcarvings, pottery as well as modern Naga paintings. The museum also conducts training in traditional songs and musical instruments such as the *Jews Harp*. It also conducts seminars and workshops in the traditional arts of basketry, textile weaving, pottery and metal works. The museum also encourages collections from other cultures in order to be innovative and proactive.

CULTURAL ACTIVITIES

The Sao Chang College museum encourages students, teachers and visitors to see and learn from the objects and discovers aspects of their culture, beliefs and values. "Education devoid of the cultures of the people in the society is empty and incomplete" (Arinze 1999: 2). By taking part in the various cultural activities organised by the museum, the museum has become a community centre for intellectual growth, spiritual sustainment, unity and a place to ponder who we are, why we are here, where did we come from and where we are going.

FINE ARTS

Historically, the five main fine arts according to Wikipedia were painting, sculpture, architecture music and poetry, with performing arts including theatre and dance. Today, fine arts commonly include additional forms, such as film, photography, video production/editing, design and printmaking. Arts can transform life and plays an important role in society.

The Cultural Committee with the English and History Department of Sao Chang College came up with the idea of forming a Fine Art Club because it was found that when students learn to appreciate art, they gain confidence as both intellectuals and as creators. "The skill requires in a sustain study in the arts teaches students how to transfer this skills into academic arenas as well. It may also help students to navigate through social and emotional issues". (Linda F. Nathan TEDx The Calhoun School).

The Fine Art Club is a recent development in Sao Chang College. It is hoped and believed that making creative work as a singer, sculptor, painter, writer, story teller and a dancer will give the young students a chance to develop a vision of self and of hope. Doing what they are good at, they will learn the art of perseverance, dedication and hard work which will be indirectly channelized

into their academic work as well.

The Fine Art Club hopes to energize the creativity of its members by conducting exhibitions, installations, music competitions, essay and short story writings, debates on important issues but most of all to help students to develop intuition, reasoning, imagination, critical thinking, problem solving and appreciation of different cultures which will nourish the soul.

SOCHUM: The Traditional system of Imparting Education.

The Sochum or youth dormitory for both girls and boys was an essential part of the early Naga life. The Sochum has many similarities to 'Gurukuls' of the early 'mainland' Indian system of education. The Sochum life not only imparts formal education but also enhances acculturation. Elders orally communicated the Naga culture, customs, traditions that passed down from generation to generation through folk songs, music and dances, folklore narrations, wood carving and weaving to the youths while they lived in the Sochums. Modernization has eroded the core value and importance of the Sochums and the practice has been reduced to its minimal. In the process, the threat to cultural and indigenous language extinction is a stark reality faced by all the Naga communities today. The college, after an exhaustive introspection, has taken up the mission to revive the Sochum system of imparting education in the college hostels. The fundamental objective is to impart the rich cultural values of the indigenous practices to the students so as to enable them adapt to the modern day life by keeping their core cultural values intact.

The urban Sochum incorporates a detailed time schedule for all activities as in the past. A specific time period is set for regular study hours. Besides the regular study hours, a separate time slot is given for the students to prepare for competitive examinations. Coaching classes are arranged to equip the students with tips and study techniques to crack different types of examination. Workshops are conducted under the guidance and wise elders from the villages as guest speakers to create awareness about the importance of preserving and respecting one's culture, ethics, traditions and languages(local dialects) to the students. To impart the students with skill developments, elders teach the students to make traditional handicrafts, bamboo baskets and mats, wooden crockery in the boys Sochum. In the girls Sochum, the students are taught to make bead works, traditional jewelleries, weave traditional garment and educate them with the meaning of every 'motifs' woven on the shawls and the traditional Mekhela(wraparound garment). Folk songs, folk dances and folklore narrations are the essential components of the traditional Naga culture which are also taught in the Sochum. The students are taught to play indigenous musical instruments such as Tongten (Log drums), Kongkin (mouth organ), etc. The Sochum focuses on acquainting the students with cultural activities, customary practices and encourages exchange of cultural programmes and other outreach programmes with the junior Sochums in the neighbouring villages. Most of the students in the college are from the economically weaker section of the society.

Hence, the *Sochum* encourages self employment through part time work in the surrounding farms and cultivation areas owned by the college to inculcate self sufficiency in the students become financially independent individuals. The Urban Sochum emphasizes on physical development as well as environmental and social issues.

The college believes that the *Sochum* system is very unique and that it should be made a core component of higher education especially because the world today is witnessing the extinction of many rich culture and indigenous languages. Urban *Sochum* probes and prompts the students to introspect on the importance of preserving one's culture and identity.

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
